#### **Genealogy Classes**





#### Microsoft OneNote Tip

Tables are a great way to keep information organized. To add a table click on **Insert** > **Table**. Enter the number of columns and rows you want to start with. You can add more later. Click in the table and use the Ta-



ble Tools Layout menu to add rows or columns, shade cells, change text alignment in the cells, sort columns, or convert the table you created to an Excel spreadsheet.

#### **Refreshing Your Research**

When I moved three years ago there was a lot going on—a big project at work and planning my wedding. My Family History materials weren't well organized as they were unpacked. It took me two years to finished unpacking all the boxes. One closet was full of shelves with three ring binders, a four drawer lateral file cabinet was overflowing with "to be filed" documents, pictures and mementos, and my external hard drive had a folder for each family full of electronic information.

It was time to get organized again so I could find things without spending hours searching. A lot of my research was done years ago, so I decided as I organized each family I would evaluate what I had and update my research plans. This would take longer but be worth the effort.

In 2015 Thomas MacEntee came out with the Genealogy Do Over program and workbook. (https://abundantgenealogy.com/genealogy-returns-2018-bonus/). I downloaded the updated version onto my Kindle (\$2.99) and read it. The idea is to hit the reset button on your research, set aside previous research and start over using best practices setting research goals, using research plans, recording all the results making sure you cite your sources, and evaluating each record you find.

I decided that it was also time to go digital. OneNote is what I use to store my research plans and results. The first step it to add a OneNote notebook for the family I'm working on. There is a separate notebook for Location background that has a tab for each county where my ancestors lived.

The search feature is great and you can link from one page/notebook to another so no need to capture the same record multiple times. I'm setting up templates for different types of records, for example for a deed cite the source, scan it, transcribe it onto a OneNote page and add a link to the scanned copy. Then I add the parcel of land to a excel spread-sheet that is embedded in the notebook which makes it easy to see if I have both the acquisition and disposition.

In addition to where I was going to organize my research results, I needed to commit time to the project. I made a commitment to myself that I would work on the project at least 4 hours a week. Life often gets in the way, by making this project a priority I keep moving forward toward my goal.

I started with the Sennott Family in Monroe County, Illinois. I didn't follow the program 100% but I did go through everything I had for that family one record at a time—I evaluated the record. If I kept it, it was scanned and added to a page in my OneNote notebook. The next step is to analyzed it recording my notes. Any To Do items it generates are added to my research plan in OneNote. Duplicate copies are discarded along with print outs from websites. Original records are stored in an acid free box in acid free folders labeled with the ancestors name and the document.

It was very tempting as I looked at each record to stop organizing and start researching, I can't say I resist all the time. If I come across something, I put it in the appropriate notebook on my To Do list and continue towards my goal of organizing my research findings. If it is something that is just too valuable to put off, I put it in the appropriate notebook and analyze it but any further research goes on the To Do list.

I have been finding records that I forgot I had and by analyzing each record carefully I'm challenging conclusions that I made previously. My research results are more organized and it is definitely easier to find things. I've also started sharing family stories on my blog, check out next month's newsletter for details.
