State Libraries and Archives - The Colorado State Archives By Lynne Darrouzet, JD, CG

Like Texas, Colorado was part of many different governmental jurisdictions as it developed. At one time, it was ruled by Spain then Mexico. It later was part of the territories of Missouri, Utah, New Mexico, unorganized Native American land, Kansas and Nebraska. The Colorado Territory was formed in 1861, and Colorado became a state in 1876.

Early migration to Colorado came primarily from the Midwestern states of Ohio, Illinois, Missouri, and Indiana, as well as New York.³ After the Civil War, most of the American-born population came from Missouri, Kansas, Nebraska and Iowa, although there was a large influx of foreign-born immigrants.⁴ By 1880, there were 3 official languages in Colorado: English, Spanish and German.⁵ This certainly explains why some of my German-born ancestors were homesteading in northeastern Colorado by the mid-1880's.

The Colorado Legislature created the first State Archivist position in 1943, and until 1959 the Archives was actually part of the Colorado State Historical Society. In 1996, the Archives was merged with several other state agencies to become part of the Division of Information Technologies, which has expanded the opportunities for accessing historical information online.

According to its website, "the Colorado State Archives is the legal repository for selected historical and contemporary records and information generated by state and local governments in Colorado."

State Records

As a repository of state records, the Archives has a number of records that are open to research, including records for: Colorado legislative history, business incorporations, penitentiary and reformatories, state volunteer and national guard military records, schools and children's homes, railroads, Civilian Conservation Corps, and mining. Some of these resources are indexed and available online (see below). Also of interest to family historians, the Archives is the repository for the State Supreme Court and Courts of Appeal from 1861 to present, and holds most of the county and district court records as well. This includes naturalization records for most counties. Although there is no state-wide index to the naturalization records, many county indexes are available at the Archives. For a listing of county-level naturalization records held at the Archives, see http://www.colorado.gov/dpa/doit/archives/natural/.

Another useful resource for genealogists, are the school census records. The Archives maintains school census records for 33 of the 63 counties. The school census may state the teacher's name, pupil's name, the name of the parents/guardian, home address, date of birth, nativity of parents and grade last attended.

Local Records

In addition to court records, the Archives has marriage records for most counties. For a specific list of holdings, see: http://www.colorado.gov/dpa/doit/archives/marr1.htm. Unfortunately, the statewide marriage indexes are incomplete. There is a statewide index from about 1890-1939, and a divorce index from about 1900-1939, an online marriage index from 1975 to present at http://www.sctc.state.co.us/marriages/default.aspx, and an online divorce index from 1851 to 1939 and 1968 to present at http://www.sctc.state.co.us/marriages/divorces.aspx. The Archives also has a collection of city directories for various cities, although their holdings are primarily 20th century directories. It is better to check libraries in the locality you are researching to find more city directories.

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Online Indexes

The Archives is in the process of creating online indexes for many of its collections. If you find a name in one of these indexes, you can contact the Archives and they will retrieve the record for you for a fee.

Some of the unique indexes that are being created are indexes to: old age pension records, poor records, probate records, inheritance tax records, and school records. There are also a number of indexes to military records. Although far from complete for all counties and years, it is a very useful aid to your research. Compared to other archives (like Illinois), the fees for research are relatively steep, in my opinion. If you have extensive research to do at the Colorado State Archives, be sure to check what is available through the Family History Library. You might also want to consider a "vaction" to Denver (lovely in any season) or hiring a local researcher:

- Colorado Residents: \$15.00 per search or name to include 3 pages of copies with additional pages of copy work at \$1.25 per page.
- Out-of-State Requests: \$25.00 per search or name to include 3 pages of copies with additional pages of copy work at \$1.25 per page.
- Certified Copies: \$10.00 and up per document.
- Professional Assistance: \$28.00 per hour charged in fifteen minute intervals (\$7.00 for every fifteen minutes).

If you are researching in Colorado, be sure to check out the resources available in the Western History and Genealogy Department of the Denver Public Library http://www.denver.lib.co.us/whg/index.html. The collection there focuses on all phases of development of the Trans-Mississippi West and the genealogy collection is the second largest between the Mississippi and the West Coast.

Also, don't forge about the Rocky Mountain Region of the National Archives which has records from over 100 Federal agencies and courts in Colorado, Montana, New Mexico, North Dakota, South Dakota, Utah, Wyoming, and other states http://www.archives.gov/rocky-mountain.
