# **Research Basics—New Locations**


As we strive to learn more about out ancestors, locations and timeframes are critical. Records and record repositories vary from one place our ancestor lived to the next and are different by timeframe. Understanding what records exist and where they can be found should be the first step in your research plan as you move from one place to the next following your ancestors. Doing research on the location before you start your search can save you time and put the location in context for you.

I recently started researching the ancestry of the Casadone family. The family lived in Dobbs Ferry, New York. The first step was to find out what county Dobbs Ferry was located in so the first stop was Roots Web Town Search (http:// resources.rootsweb.ancestry.com/cgi-bin/townco.cgi). Dobbs Ferry is in Westchester County.

Next stop—the Family History Wiki on Ancestry.com to check *Red Book: American State, County, and Town Sources*. Westchester county was formed in 1683. Vital records start in 1880 but compliance to the law was slow and many events in that time period weren't recorded. Probate records are handled by the Surrogate's Court in White Plains, NY; early deeds are at the Records Center and Archives in Elmsford, NY

and later deeds are at the County Courthouse in White Plains.

On to FamilySearch.org to the Wiki to see what information is available on Westchester and Dobbs Ferry. There was a map of the county outlining the townships. There was also a link to a website showing the county boundary changes in New York. I learned that there was a state census that is extant for Westchester County in 1905, 1915 and 1925. I also found a page about a website that focuses on this area Old Fulton NY Post Cards. It started as a postcard digitization project but evolved into the largest free online collection of newspapers for New York. (http://www.fultonhistory.com/). The wiki page lists the newspapers that are included. There were newspapers from Dobbs Ferry from 1884-1969 listed. Wikipedia provided background on Dobb's Ferry.



Despite the temptation to dive right into the newspapers, I started with a census search and found the family in the 1920, 1930, and 1940 federal census records and the 1925 NY State census. The 1920 census says the family immigrated from Italy in 1903 but I couldn't find the family in the 1910 federal census or the 1915 NY state census. I also found alternative spellings of Casadonta, Casadonte, and Cassadone.

A search on FamilySearch.com resulted in the marriage record of Jack (Giacomo) Casadonte and Concetta Salerno in Dobbs Ferry on 20 December 1908. I also found the probate card index for Giacomo who died 30 March 1865. Don't forget to look at the record collections that have been digitized, don't just search the index. The probate card images are available but they haven't been indexed yet.

A search on Ancestry.com resulted in the Social Security Death Index and City Directories from Tarrytown, NY where Giacomo lived between 1914-1918.

The search of the newspaper website provided more details. Obituaries of the family members included the names of the towns in Italy where they were born—Chiaravalle Centrale. Wikipedia provided the location of the town and the name of the province, Catanzaro, and region, Calabria. Now I have more new locations to research, I need to learn about the Calabri region in Italy so I downloaded a book on using Italian Records. Each time you find an ancestor in a new location, take the time to learn about the location where they lived before you start searching.

At Nathan E. White's Department Store yesterday, Mrs. Rice Brown said the recent rains Saturday were half a tub full. Nathan White said his rain gage showed .61 inches of rain. The rain was appreciated.

Mrs. Arthur Kirkwood brought the News a big, fat pencil from her vacation in Ohio where she visited her son and family, the J. C. Kirkwoods. Another pencil was from St. Louis added to the New's collection.

A box filled with pencils address to Pencil Bagwill arrived this week adding more to our collection. It was from Robert E. B. Fielder of Plano and Van Alstyne, owner of the Plano Building Materials and supply. So, Mr. Don W. Bagwill of the Plano Star-Courier now has a nickname.

Mr. W. L. "Leon" Dugger, Ford dealer, of Dugger motors also brought pencils by the paper this week as did Mr. and Mrs. W. O. Haggard.

Mr. Don W. Bagwill accompanied Rev. and Mrs. Edgar L. Huffstutler and their two children Stephen and Susan to Farmersville for the religious festival. The children were polite, but there was never a dull moment. Rev. Huffstutler is minister of the Methodist Church.

Rev. Arthur Fineout, , minister of the First Baptist Church, is the program chairman for the District Assembly in Plano at the noon meeting and program on April 20. As this is the first time in the District Assembly's history to be held in Plano, the Rotarians are looking forward to the event. Nathan E. White is the district chairman of the event. E. A. 
