Bamman and Melchiori Honored for Their Service

Both Gale Williams Bamman and Marie Varrelman Melchiori were honored with Emeritus status recently for their "years of service, their contributions to the genealogical community, and their deep experience and expertise," announced Board for Certification of Genealogists (BCG) president Jeanne Larzalere Bloom at the May meeting.

The announcement written by the BCG reads: Gale is the longest active credentialed genealogist with 42 years of experience. She has held Certified Genealogical Record Specialist (CGRS), Certified American Lineage Specialist (CALS), Certified Genealogist (CG), Certified Genealogical Lecturer (CGL), as well as having published in major journals, and published in major journals.

Melchiori was first certified as CGRS in 1980. In the thirty-five years since, she consistently worked as a full-time researcher and lecturer, dutifully recertifying every five years and earning her CGL certification in 1995.

Both Gale and Marie served the Board in many ways over the years and received many awards and recognition for their genealogical Brenda Kellow pursuits.

The Alamo Farewell

THE ALAMO FAREWELL, A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT GENERAL OF THE DAUGHTERS OF THE REPUBLIC OF TEXAS

The Alamo was the site of a major battle in the Texas Revolution in 1836. Over 180 men defending the Alamo were killed during the fight with Mexican forces. From this devastating conflict came the Texas battle cry, "Remember the Alamo" when Texas soldiers once again fought the Mexican forces at the Battle of San Jacinto on April 21, 1836 that finalized independence from Mexico.

The Daughters of the Republic of Texas (DRT) began caring for the Alamo shrine in 1905, over a century ago. On July 10, the management of the

Alamo shifted from the DRT to the General Land Office of Texas. Below is the statement at the closing ceremonies made by the President General of the Daughters of the Republic of Texas, Dr. Betty Edwards.

Dear Daughters,

After 110 years, this is the last day of The Daughters as caretakers of The Alamo,

"The Alamo is not ancient history. It is no more ancient than love is an old story, for nothing is ancient and nothing is old which every day teaches something that is fine, beautiful and brave" - Richard H Davis 1892.

The Daughters of The Republic of Texas have been dedicated to the preservation of the heritage of Texans since our inception in 1891. Many of our most visible activities occurred here at the Shrine.

In response to Clara Driscoll, Adina de Zavalla and other women who called for the rescue of the neglected-decayed site of the 1836 battle. The Texas legislature in 1905, made The Daughters, Custodians of The Alamo. For 106 years, without state money assistance, The Daughters operated and improved The Alamo using money from their gift shop. The Daughters transformed The Alamo into a tourist site and also introduced Republic of Texas history to millions of school children and international visitors. While at the same time supporting preservation efforts of this historic structure. The Daughters understand politicians come and go, political regimes come and go, The Daughters will remain.

Our Alamo Legacy will live on.

The Daughters have learned the lesson of The Alamo to carry on loyally and unafraid; never surrendering even though she must ask to have her cot lifted across the line.

Since the daughters will not physically be saving our daily Morning Prayers with out Defenders—We offer them now.

A note from Helen Jenkins

One of my own – Seaborn(e) A. Mills was one in the massacre whose body was left in the field for wild animals to devour, leaving their bones to bleach in the sun and finally to be placed in a common grave. Please note those mentioned on the large stone at Goliad. Believe the Cry was – Remember Goliad before - Remember the Alamo.
