#### **Civil War Records**

From 1861 to 1865 the United States was embroiled in the Civil War. Over 3.8 million soldiers, union and confederate combined, served in the conflict. This unfortunate event touched many of our ancestors lives and records were generated for numerous reasons based on both sympathy and location. Don't assume that because your ancestor lived in a Southern state that their service was Confederate and vice versa.

Union Records—The most obvious records are those of service in the United States Army and Navy. Different records exist for soldiers who served in the Regular Army than those who service was in the Voluntary Army. Service records for the Regular Army are available at the National Archives. Separate records are available for enlistment, payroll, muster out, hospital, etc. Service records can be found at both the Federal and State level for volunteer service. Let's discuss the Federal records first.

Indexes—The United States Park Service has created a web site, the Civil War Sailors and Soldiers System. You can search for soldiers, sailors, regiments, prisoners, cemeteries, battles, medals. You can also check *The Roster of Union Soldiers* by James B. Hewett.

Compiled Service Records—To provide easier access to the information, beginning in 1890 the Federal Government created Compiled Service Records. A card was created for each entry on numerous service records including, enlistment, muster out, payroll, hospital, etc. Information can include a physical description of your ancestor, where and when their service began and ended. You can also track the locations of the unit by using the payroll records. The information regarding each soldier was extracted from the original record onto a card. Each card also contains a number which corresponds to the original record so you can locate the original. The cards for service in each unit were combined into a file. Therefore, if your ancestor served in multiple units there may be more than one file for them. Don't assume that your ancestor didn't serve if they were elderly, they may have served for as little as three months in a local unit that never left home.

The index to the Compiled Service Records is available on microfilm at the National Archives and also on Ancestry.com. The records for most states have not been microfilmed and are only available at the National Archives (NARA) in Washington DC. However, using the numbers, unit name, and state from the index you can order the file from the NARA web site [www.archives.gov].

There are also Compiled Service Records for the Unit. You

can trace the progress of the unit throughout the war. Cards indicate where the unit was located for each time period and which battles they were involved in. Using your ancestors dates of service and these records can provide insight into your ancestors experiences.

Pension Records—Many of the soldiers, their spouses and even their parents were eligible for pensions based on the soldiers service. Files were created even if the pension was denied. Dependent parent pension files can be very informative, the parent has to prove their relationship to the soldier. One file I found included the parents marriage record, the soldier's baptismal record and letters from all his siblings and some neighbors containing details of his father's living conditions.

Draft Records—The casualties were high and initially volunteer service was for short periods of time (as little as three months), therefore, a shortage of men arose. The result was a draft. Draft boards were appointed in each district. The Draft board appointed officials who were responsible for enumerating all men eligible for service. The criteria changed over time, the most comprehensive was men between ages of 17 and 46 who had not served two consecutive years during the Civil War. These Consolidate Lists are included in Record Group 110 and are available by mail.

Once the names were gathered and quotas were established for each sub district names from the list were placed in a box and the required number of names were drawn. The names were recorded in a ledger. The men were notified and subjected to a physical examination. The results of the exams were also recorded in a ledger. If they passed the exam they were mustered into service. These ledgers are part of Record Group 110. If your ancestor was an immigrant, a case file for drafted aliens was also created. These files are part of Record Group 59.

It was legal for a drafted man to hire a substitute to serve in his place or to pay \$300 in place of service. Also, the Draft Boards kept diaries of their daily activities which can contain information about the draft process, timing of the drafts, and individual soldiers, both those that enlisted and were drafted.

The diaries and ledgers created in this process, if extant, are available at NARA [Record Group 110]. These are textual records and you must either visit NARA or hire a researcher who to visit. You will need to know where your ancestor lived at the time. There are finding aids available at NARA to help you determine which district your ancestor lived in and then you can use the Preliminary Inventory to determine what (*Continued on page 6*)

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records are extant by district. The records are not indexed so it can take time to locate your ancestor.

Income Tax Records—The war was also expensive and to supplement the US Treasury an income tax was instituted. On July 1, 1862 (12 Stat. 432) the Internal Revenue Act was passed so the government could pay interest on the public debt. There were both monthly and annual taxes. The monthly taxes were levied on gross receipts of transportation companies; on interest paid on bonds; on surplus funds accumulated by financial institutions and insurance companies; the sale of slaughtered cattle, hogs, and sheep. There were also annual licenses required for trades and occupations, and annual duties were placed on carriages, yachts, billiard tables, and gold and silver plate. An annual tax was levied on all income in excess of \$600,a nd legacies and distributive shares of personal property were made taxable. If your ancestor was taxed it will give you insight into their economic situation and possibly their occupation. These records are part of Record Group 58, Records of the Internal Revenue Service. The Assessment lists from 1862-1866 have been microfilmed. There is a separate series for each northern state and are available at NARA.

Regimental and Unit Histories—Once you know which unit your ancestor served in and during which time period you can use histories to relive their experience. They are available at NARA, the Family History Library (FHL) and on the internet. A google search on the state or unit you are looking for can result in numerous hits. You can also find diaries from soldiers, possibly even from the unit your ancestor served in. They will offer a realistic picture of life in service.

Soldiers Homes—Congress established Soldiers Homes in 1866 for needy veterans of the army, marines, and organized militia called into federal service. Records are available for 1866-1937 including registers of residents, hospital admissions, death lists, etc. Some have been microfilmed and are available through the Family History Library.

### **Civil War Records**

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Military Academies—NARA has microfilmed Academy Cadet Application Papers 1805-1866 on M688, Naval Academy Registers of Delinquencies 1846-1850 and 1852-1882, M991.

Death and Burial Records—Nearly 359,000 Union soldiers lost their lives during the war. The *Roll of Honor: Names of Soldiers Who Died in Defense of the American Union, 27 Volumes* is a good place to start your search. There is also an index available and a CD. NARA Record Group 92 also includes applications for head stones, registers of national cemeteries, and lists of soldiers buried in state cemeteries.

We have just begun to tap the surface of records that are available for the Civil War, next month we will focus on records available at the State level and Confederate records.
