# Funding for NHPRC Update

The House of Representatives has restored funding for the National Historical Publications and Records Commission in its budget bill--\$5.5 million for competitive grants and \$2 million for program administration. The House Subcommittee on Treasury, Transportation, HUD, and the Judiciary added the funding back on June 15, and the House Appropriations Committee approved that addition on June 21. This is a very positive result at this stage, and the organizations and individuals who raised their voices to request restoration of funding can be very pleased.

Of course there's more to be done, but now in the Senate, to preserve this funding or to raise it to the \$8 million in grants and \$2 million in administration that the archives, records management, history, and research community has identified as the essential level of funding.

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#### State Archives & Libraries—Oklahoma

The state of Oklahoma, a part of the Louisiana Territory, evolved out of Indian Territory, created in 1830, and Oklahoma Territory created in 1890. It is the home of the Five Civilized Tribes: Creek, Cherokee, Chickasaw, Choctaw, and Seminole. [To remember these, I use the memory tool: Four tribes with a "c" and one with an "s."] These were not the only American Indians residing in the state. Please remember that there were a total of sixty-five different tribes making their home in Oklahoma. Before research can be successful, it is essential for the researcher to have a complete understanding of both Indian and Oklahoma Territories. To help with the understanding, there are maps of the territories in the manuscript collection of the University of Oklahoma.

Researching in Oklahoma can be both fun and baffling. The people at the libraries and archives are fun, but finding the item being searched is often perplexing. It is often the case that to be successful, you have to physically go from place to place or even drive to another city. If you are having trouble, below is a little guide that may help you search for you roots in Oklahoma.

Vital information after statehood began in 1908, however, general compliance, like other states, did not become standard operating procedure until the 1930s. The Division of Vital Statistics is located at the State Department of Health, 1000 N.E. 10<sup>th</sup> St., Post Office Box 53551, Oklahoma City, OK 73152. In order to obtain a vital record the researcher must provide a purpose and relationship statement. Some marriage records created before statehood in 1907 are housed in the courthouse of the county where the marriage was performed. An index to some marriage records are online at <a href="www.chickasawhistory.com/m\_index.htm">www.chickasawhistory.com/m\_index.htm</a>, and others for the counties of Greer, Harmon and Jackson Counties at <a href="www.rootsweb.com/~okgreer/olgrmarr.html">www.rootsweb.com/~okgreer/olgrmarr.html</a>. Remember, before Greer County was part of Oklahoma, it was a part of Texas.

The Oklahoma Department of Libraries, is located at 200 N.E. 18<sup>th</sup> Street in Oklahoma City 73105, and is the location of the Archives where most researchers go first for information. Filed here, in the basement, are the newspaper files containing all kinds of information to help in your search. A search of the newspapers unearthed a death that occurred in Oklahoma County but was published in the western panhandle papers. Hint: Be painfully thorough in your research techniques. The benefits can be beneficial.

Guides will be of interest also. A guide to the archives and

libraries is found in the 2002 issue of *Footsteps*, volume 17:2. The *Chronicles of Oklahoma* by Tanya D. and G. Allen Finchum is also helpful. So is the book, *Guide to the Historical Records of Oklahoma* by Bradford Koplowitz; and *Genealogical and Local History Collections in Oklahoma*, by Paul Follett and Melodie Sanders.

At the Oklahoma Historical Society Records Division, 2100 N. Lincoln, Oklahoma City 73105-4997, is a bibliography of Miscellaneous Microfilm Oklahoma Historical Society Library Resources Division, compiled by John Maricle. They also house the Catalog of Oral Histories by the Oral History Program committee of the society. Found there also is A Guide to Newspapers and Newspaper Holdings in Oklahoma; Index to Death Records of Oklahoma, the Oklahoma Historical Library and Archives, by Joyce Rex; Indian Archives Index; Indian Archives Inventory found in the Premier Issue of Journal of American Indian Family Research; Oklahoma Cemeteries; Oklahoma Marriages; and, Preliminary Inventory, Blacks.

The University of Oklahoma Bizzell Library, 401 W. Brooks St., Norman 73019, houses many manuscript collections on Western History. Of particular interest to American Indian researchers is Cherokee Nation Papers Inventory and Index; American Indian Resource Materials in the Western History Collections University of Oklahoma by Donald L. DeWitt; Guide to Photographs in the Western History Collections of the University of Oklahoma compiled by Kristina L. Southwell.

Oklahoma is a Public Domain State. The land records are available from the Bureau of Land Management and Bureau of Indian Affairs Agency. When the online homepage is working, information can be found at <a href="www.blm.gov/">www.blm.gov/</a>. Chances are that if a record applies to any event or person within the Five Civilized Tribes, the information is also available at the National Archives Southwest Division in Fort Worth. Even so, a thorough search within the state of Oklahoma is essential.

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# Collin County Bits—Collin County's Only Civil War Battle By Joy Gough

Around 1860 the wooden Collin County courthouse was moved from the square in McKinney to a side street in order to build a new courthouse. Large stones were piled in the center of the square for the construction. Collin County's only Civil War battle took place across the stones in the square. Because of the Civil War, the new courthouse was not built until 1872.

About the latter part of 1862, a group of men went to the home of an old couple named Lackey, who lived near the Kaufman County line (now Rockwall County) near Millwood (south of Lavon) and demanded the family's money. They tortured the old man in front of his wife, trying to get him to tell them where his money was hidden. He never told them the location of the money and was killed. The men ransacked the house looking for money. Two twenty-dollar gold pieces were hidden in the wife's ball of yarn. She sat there knitting while the men tortured her husband. The men threw the yarn ball around but never found the money inside it. [Weekly Democrat Gazette, August 15, 1929, "Millwood."]

It was rumored that the men were part of Quantrell's group and were staying at the Tucker Hotel in McKinney. In January 1863 Collin County Sheriff James L. Read, along with his cousin and former chief justice of Collin County J. M. McReynolds and Joseph E. Holcomb, rode into McKinney square from the southwest with a posse of twenty-six men to find the killers of Mr. Lackey.

Sixteen men supposedly of Quantrell's army were on the porch of the Tucker Hotel, which was on the northeast corner of the McKinney square. A gun battle ensued across the square. The sheriff's posse was armed with shotguns while Quantrell's men had long range rifles. Read's men retreated to the old Wetsel mill a few blocks down the street and barricaded themselves inside. All of the posse's horses were killed. During the night all of the posse members escaped. Read, McReynolds, Holcomb, and a Mr. Davis left for East Texas, where they sought protection at a Confederate camp in Tyler. Quantrell's men followed them. Even though the men were veterans of the war and had served their terms of enlistment, they were arrested as deserters. They were turned over to a mob and Quantrell's men. After a kangaroo court, Read, McReynolds, Davis and Holcomb were found guilty for being Confederate deserters or "Union sympathizers." The sentence was death by hanging.

The mob had only one rope, so they could hang one man at a time. Sheriff Read was the first one hanged. It is said that he cursed the mob to the end. Holcomb and McReynolds were next. Davis was the last one. Someone knew that Davis' father was in the Confederate camp and went to notify him of the hangings. The father was able to intervene and save his son.

No one knows the exact burial place of Sheriff Read, the only Collin County sheriff hanged while in office. There is a write-up of this incident in a recent history of Smith County.
