National Personnel Records Center

The National Personnel Records Center in St. Louis houses military records from the 20th Century. In the past the only way to obtain records was through the mail. Beginning, Saturday, June 11, 2005 some records will be open to visitors. A fire at the records center in 1973 destroyed files of the Army and Air Force veterans. Negotiations between the Pentagon and the National Archives resulted in records from the Navy and Marines will be opened to the public 62 years after the soldier left the service. Army and Air Force files will not be opened until 2023. Coast Guard will be unavailable until 2026.

As of Saturday the following records will be opened to the public: Navy enlisted men from 1885 until September 8, 1939; Marine Corps enlisted men from 1906 to 1939; 150 of about 3000 Americans identified as persons of exceptional prominence—Patton, Elvis Presley, McArthur, Jackie Robinson—just to name a few. All of the VIP's have been dead at least 10 years.

To obtain records through the mail, complete form 180 which can be downloaded on the National Archives web site www.archives.gov. Files will continue to be available to the veterans and their descendants. If you wish to visit the center their hours for visitors are 10-4 Tuesday through Friday. Visitors must show a picture ID. Muster Rolls: A list of soldiers serving in a particular unit.

State Archives

Receipt Rolls: A record of pay received by the soldiers. State Archives

Bounty Grants: 320 a. per 3 months service in the Army of the Republic of Texas. Prorated for additional time served. State Archives

Donation Grants: 640 a. for special service: San Jacinto, Siege of Bexar, Goliad, The Alamo. Later given to surviving widows of said soldiers. State Archives.

Headright: Given to those who arrived in the Republic prior to 2 March 1836. Married men received one league & one labor or 4,600 acres. Single men received 1/3 league or 1,476 acres. State Archives

Class Grants: [Class grants are date related.] State Archives

First Class Grants: Arrived prior to 1 March 1836; excludes Indians, Africans and descendants of Africans. Received league and labor, or 4,605 acres.

Second Class Grants: Given to men who arrived in the Republic after 2 March 1836 but prior to 1 October 1837. Married men received 1,280 acres and single received 640 acres.

Third Class Grants: Given to men arriving after 1 Oct. 1837 but before 1 Jan. 1840. Married men received 640 acres, single received 320.

Fourth Class Grants: Given to those arriving in the Re-

public after 1 Jan. 1840 but before 1 Jan. 1842. Married men received 640 acres, single 320 acres.

Preemption Grants: Homestead Claims were for those who actually resided on the tract of land of no more than 320 acres for at least 3 years between 22 Jan. 1845 and 1854.

Cemeteries

Kim Parson, *A Reference to Texas Cemetery Records* (Humble, TX: Privately printed, 1988). This book lists every known cemetery in the state [as of copyright date]; indicates whether or not the cemetery has been inventoried; identifies the publication in which the cemetery appears.

Census

The Gladys Harrington Library has all available census for the state of Texas, 1850-1930, on either CD or microfilm. Many special census are also available here for agriculture, manufacturing, and slave census.

The 1870 Federal Census for the State of Texas is now indexed and available in book form in various libraries in the state including the Dallas Public Library. The 1920 census and soundex is presently being acquired by many of the larger libraries in the state.

History

In 1836 — Texas declared independence from Mexico on 2 March at Washington-on-the-Brazos and won her independence at the Battle of San Jacinto on 21 April with the defeat of Santa Anna. Municipalities were soon organized into 36 counties. The Republic of Texas existed until 19 February 1846.
