## **Genealogy Class**

Online Genealogy will be offered at Collin College on Wednesday nights from October 1 to Novermber 5th 6:30 to 9:00 pm. This is a hands on class taught by Barbara Coakley. The class focuses on using online resources in your family history research.

#### Leona Richardson

One of our former speakers died this month. Leona Richardson spoke to us about courthouse research. This was a subject which she knew well since she had worked for the County Clerk's office in Collin County for over 20 years.

Those of us who were doing Collin County deed research 20 years ago remember Leona. She was the one who asked everybody, "Can I hep ya?" She worked in the deed department back before computers and before the files and deeds were scanned and digitized. She is the one who taught me how to use the old deed books and indices. She had worked for a Title company before that. She knew all about land records. She retired about 15 years ago.

Leona was born and raised in the northeastern part of the county, east of Blue Ridge. She was a fount of historic information about the area. She lived a couple of miles east of Blue Ridge in the Frognot community. The Frognot School had been located on her property. All that is left of Frognot now is the water department that supplies water for much of the area between Farmersville and Blue Ridge, to the east and north county lines. While traveling north on Hwy 78 near Blue Ridge, you may have seen the water towers with the big green frog painted on them. That's the Frognot Water Department.

When the Texas State Historical Marker was obtained for Frognot, she supplied much of the historic information. Ironically, the Frognot historical marker will be dedicated on June 28, just weeks after her death. She was buried in the Blue Ridge Cemetery. She will be missed.

#### Lavon State Bank

#### Lavon State Bank

The Collin County Historical marker for the Lavon State Bank was dedicated on May 17. The bank was located on the north side of the town of Lavon next to present-day Hwy 78. Directions to the site are to take Hwy 78 to Lavon. At the north end of the viaduct, immediately turn east. The building will be at the corner of the first cross street.



The Lavon State Bank was built in 1907. The construction of the bank building required that the home of Civil War veteran James L. Rees and Marandia Rees be moved down the street from the construction site. The home was rolled on logs, with Mrs. Rees continuing to prepare

a meal for boarders while it was rolled. A team of mules pulled the house with logs under it; when one log came out at the back, the men would hurriedly place it under the front of the house for it to

continue to roll. Lula Forder, who was a young girl, remembered sitting on the stairway watching the Native Americans pass by their home during this time. The house, which was

moved for the bank site, still stands today as the oldest home in Lavon.

Once the home was moved, the Lavon State Bank and an adjoining store were built together.

Mr. Lee Cade was the owner of the store. The bank had a counter for the teller to make transactions and a safe to secure money. The bank was very prosperous; it was owned by

O. C. Bergin at one time. Times became difficult, and the bank closed on December 18, 1920; it merged into the First State Bank of Wylie, Texas. Later, the bank building was used for a saw shop, a café, and an antique store. Miles and Juanita Williams had a café in the bank building in the 1950's and 1960's. In the 1960's, scenes from the movie, Bonnie and Clyde, were shot in the bank. In 2002, Robert Shaw restored the building, the only remaining historic building in the original town site of Lavon. In 2013, the historic building is used as an antique store by owners, Robert and Elena Shaw.

Citizens are excited about the increased water supply becoming available to the city. Water rates have increased in anticipation of the forthcoming cost. Lake Lavon cost over twelve million dollars to build will keep us supplied with water through the ages. It is thousands of acres of reclaimed land and has 83 miles of shoreline.

PUZZLE: From the abstracted obituary on page one of the newspaper for Dr. Daniel Lee McDowell, how many clues are evident for a family historian?

ANSWER: His birthday, using time and date calculator at www.timeanddate.com/date/dateadd.html, was Monday, July 1, 1878; Place of birth; exact date of death, time and place; wife's maiden name; date of marriage and place; date moved to Plano; occupation; married names of daughters and places of residence; sons' names and residences; numbers of grandchildren and great-grandchildren; possibly a Baptist by faith.

Is this all you can learn? No. This obituary is abstracted from a newspaper. Don't stop with an abstracted copy. If you read the microfilm copy or a copy online, you will find many more facts. The first glaring difference I noticed was that he was actually born April 27, 1879, therefore there is a discrepancy causing the researcher to check Collin County death records; his parents' names; moved at age 16 from Tennessee to Rockwall, Texas; information about him from age 16 onward; his schooling; churches he ministered; only four of their six children grew to be adults; member of the Woodmen of the World; and more.

Always read the obituary or article yourself to find all the clues.
