March is Women's History Month

Some of the hardest people to find on our Family Trees are the women. When they married their name changed and they became Mrs. ______. During much of history, once they married they had limited rights and were legally 'feme covert' or covered by their husbands. Her legal rights were suspended when she married and were consolidated into those of her husband. Women could not enter into contracts or buy or sell land. Education opportunities were limited for many women. In some places women could not make a will without the permission of her husband. Most records that mention women were created by the men in their lives—father, husband, sons, and brothers. The exception to this were widows and women who never married.

We have to think creatively to find records about women. Here are a few suggestions:

- Marriage Records—Civil, church or announcements in the newspaper. These are one of the few records that include the woman's maiden name.
- Death Records—Obituaries, death certificates, church records, funeral home records, and cemetery records can provide details about her life, parents, etc. The accuracy of the information in these records is dependent on the informant. Pay attention to who provided the information and evaluate how they would have acquired the information.
- Family Bibles—There are collections of family bibles available
- Land Records—If her husband owned property, when it was sold his wife would have to release her dower right. It will include her first name. Look at land records for divisions of property from estates of the other men in her life her father or brother.
- Probate Records—Look for records of the men in her life, her husband, father, sons, brothers, uncles, etc. She might be listed as an heir. If she is married often her husband will be listed as well.
- County Histories—Look for biographies of the men in her life. Often the biographies of the men included information on their wives and her family.
- Newspapers—Search for Mrs. _____ to find out about her activities. There are often articles about charitable organizations, clubs, women's activities she might have participated in.
- Pension Records—Pension records for the soldier often mention their wives and children and widows were eligible to file for pensions for their husbands service. They had to prove they were married so there are often marriage records included in the file as well as testimony from the widow and other family members or neighbors.
- Fraternal Organizations—many organizations for men had women's auxiliaries. If she was involved there might be records. Check local libraries, historical societies, or manuscript collections for these records.
- Poor House Records—These can be harder to find, check FamilySearch, Digital Public Library of America, and Internet Archive.
- Social History—What was going on in the location and time when she lived? Was your ancestor a suffragette, did she work during war times when most of the men were off fighting, etc.
