Family Feud: Skeleton in the Closet?

I've heard the story since I was quite young, my maternal grandmother had three brothers; one died young, one was our Uncle Fred, and the third brother wouldn't speak to her, or even acknowledge her death. Unfortunately, she died when I was 4 ½ years old, so I have only vague memories of her.

When I was older my mom explained that Grandmother would not discuss her brother, nor much about anyone in her family. She was unwilling, or unable to shed any light on what had happened to create such animosity between a brother and sister.

Then, a few years before her death my mom asked me if I could do her a favor. "Would you find out what happened between my mother and her brother" she asked. "It would really mean a lot to me."

Okaaay!! Sure, Mom, I'll see what I can do. How could I deny my eighty-six-year-old mom anything? So, I began my search by signing up for Ancestry—just a two-week trial. Didn't think I'd find anything on the family at all so no need to pay for a permanent membership, right?

My grandmother's name was Gertrude Calkins/Caulkins. It took less than a minute for her name to pop up on the 1900 Federal Census. She was right there with Uncle Fred, her brother, Frank, and my Great-Grandmother, Mary. That was her for sure. I'd met Uncle Fred, and my mom was named after her Grandmother, Mary. I knew I'd found the correct family.

Wait, there are supposed to be three brothers, and where's Dad? Mary is listed as married and Head of the house. More digging found that the third brother, Harry, was living with Mary's father and his large family. Still no sign of Dad.

Five years later, after many hours of searching including a trip to Salt Lake City, hoping to find what had happened to Mary's husband, Randal Calkins, a hint popped up on Ancestry.com. It took me several more months to confirm that this was the same man. I'd found my Great-grandfather in an Indian School in New Mexico! He'd abandoned his wife and four children and settled there, married another woman and, according to several newspaper clippings, was loved by everyone in the town. An all-around nice guy.

He left New York about three years after my grandmother was born. Something had gone terribly wrong. Did he ever get divorced from Mary? Did his leaving cause the rift between Harry and Gertrude? Why was Harry living with his grandfather and not his immediate family? What had happened??

My mom passed away in January of 2014, two years before I saw that Ancestry hint. But with all that I've learned, I have never been able to answer her original question. The family skeleton is still buried deep in that closet.
