# Websites for Research in England, Scotland, Wales and Ireland

The Family History Federation in Britain held a conference on November 14th. I have a non-conformist (Roman Catholic) family that immigrated from Lancashire to New Orleans in 1830 and I needed some help to understand what records are available and where they are. There was a session on Researching Non-Conformist Ancestors included in the conference so I got up at 4 am on Saturday morning when the first session started, boy am I glad I did. In addition to 23 lectures, I had a consultation with a professional genealogist from the UK, all for 5 pounds (\$6.61). I was able to attend lectures because they were offered virtually that I never would have been able to see in person.

### **Fulton Mansion**

The Fulton Mansion may look like a set piece from an old movie, but it
was outfitted with advanced technology when it was built in the 1870s.
George and Harriet Fulton were wealthy from cattle ranching, meat
packing, and shipping, which allowed them to build this luxurious Second Empire-style home. It included indoor plumbing, supplied via rainwater collection, in the sinks and toilets; gas lighting throughout the
home; and central heating from a basement furnace that kept all four
stories warm. The Fultons were some of the first people on the South
Texas coast to have these innovations.

George Fulton died on October 31, 1893. Harriet soon left the mansion to live with her daughter, after which the building served as a hotel, restaurant, and RV park attraction before it came into state ownership. The Texas Parks & Wildlife Department operated the mansion from 1976 until 2008, when it was transferred to the THC.
