Letter From Brenda Kellow

Celebrating Family History Month in October is especially a joy for the Genealogy Friends. We celebrate seven great years since we began with only a handful of members and a dream of making a better genealogy library for everyone in the community.

September brought much for Genealogy Friends of Plano [Collin County, Texas] Libraries, Inc. to celebrate. The group was formed in 1997 by nine library junkies with the purpose of educating the members and the library patrons, and supporting the genealogy section of the library through generous donations of microform, CD-ROMs, and valuable printed instruction and finding aids. This was accomplished through

- Fund Raisers.
- Library Lock-Ins,
- Salt Lake City retreat;
- April and September all day workshops featuring nationally known speakers, devoted, generous members.
 - O Airfares, and meals for out of town speakers are donated by various Genealogy Friends to perpetuate the genealogical word.
- Free Saturday seminars offered every third Saturday of the month at the library given by professionals in the area who donate their time rather than accept an honorarium.

Seeing a need for the genealogy department to come into the approaching twenty-first century was of prime importance. GHL is the largest genealogy library in the county. Genealogy Friends' goal was to

- build GHL's titles,
- develop a genealogy collection that was appropriate for a city the size of Plano,
- and to reflect the sophistication of the rapidly growing technological retirement community.

To date, Genealogy Friends has given \$50,000 in books, microfilm, CDs, and electronic support to the genealogy library. This includes the federal census on microform for every state from the beginning in 1790 to 1850. We just donated another 364 rolls of film this morning.

Genealogy Friends have donated

 the entire census collection for Collin County 1850-1930;

- all the Collin County records and indexes available on film from the inception of the county in 1846 to well into the twentieth century;
- pertinent indexes target every state and subject;
- numerous finding aids;
- an LCD projector for genealogy programs at the library;
- \$3,000 for the continuation of this year's subscription to TexShare which includes the HeritageQuest library;
- the HeritageQuest book collection of 1860 federal census indexes for the southern states;
- and the county newspaper collection on microform.

Projects include

- indexing and posting online at www.rootsweb.com/
 -txgfpl of the 1930 census index for the county;
- publishing the Plano Star Courier newspapers index;
- indexing and publishing the 1867 Collin County voter registration index.
- Genealogy Friends built three Web sites for their various agendas.

Some of its members acquired thousands of historical photographs of the people and places within the county and share these through the *Genealogy Friends' Past Finders' Historic Photographs of Collin County* site at www.rootsweb.com/~txcolli3.

Three of the biggest moneymakers are the

- quarterly Library Lock-Ins, such as the one scheduled for October 29,
- followed closely by the annual retreat to Salt Lake City and the Family History Library,
- and the annual April and September workshops.

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DNA and Genealogy

In October, Leo Baca returned to talk to us about DNA. Here is a recap of his lectures.

DNA can be used when records run out. You can connect branches of the family through DNA testing, confirm your family tree, confirm variants of surnames, and locate areas to further your research. There are two types of DNA tests used in conjunction with genealogy, Mitochondrial (Female) and Y Chromosome (Male). These two types of DNA are passed in tact from one generation to the next.

Mitochondrial DNA is passed from mother to child. There are 500 basis points that are used in the current test. Using the characteristics from the DNA the haplogroup is identified. The 33 haplogroups have been designated with women's names. There are seven haplogroups in Europe, they are names Ursula, Xenia, Helena, Velda, Tara, Katrine, and Jasmine. The 500 basis points are compared to the Cambridge Reference Sequence (CRS) and the differences between your mitochondrial DNA and the CRS indicate which haplotype you belong to. The differences are denoted on your results in red. Using the position of the red letter and the letter, you determine the position. The letter in the first position is 16001 so you count to the red letter, record the position and the letter. 16176 T, 16219 G. Go to the www.shelob.bioanth.cam.uk/mtDNA/hvrlh.html, which is an online database and enter the coordinates of your red letters. The results will be your haplotype. You can then look for papers on that specific haplotype, which will provide more information about your ancestors. These can be found by doing a search on Google for the haplogroup and haplotype. Y Chromosome DNA is passed from father to son. This is the DNA done for surname studies. 95% of all Europeans descended from 10 men. There are two common tests, 12 marker and 25 marker tests. Using the test results which will be a set of numbers, enter the haplotype combinations in the database at http://ystr.charite.de. Then use the information to locate technical papers (see above).

There is also a list group dedicated to DNA genealogy-DNA -L@rootsweb.com. You can subscribe on the Roots Web site. This is a great reference point to ask questions and expand your knowledge.

To learn more about your family DNA, contact either Oxford Ancestors (www.oxfordancestors.com) or Family Tree DNA (www.familytreedna.com). They will

send you a kit, you use the enclosed swabs to capture DNA from your cheek and return it to them. You can also check the Family Tree DNA website to see if there is a surname study in progress for your surname.

DNA won't tell you who your great-grandfather was but it could give you a new location to check, prove you really are related to the other person with the same surname, or confirm that your ancestors came from the area of the world you suspected.



Supporting Local Societies

I would like to address an issue that many genealogical and historical societies are experiencing in this day of busy schedules and Internet access -- the loss of membership.

Internet researchers should be aware that much of the information available on the many research sites is there because genealogical societies all over the world have done a wonderful job of abstracting and publishing that information. However, without members this work and these wonderful small libraries can not survive long. Both financial support and volunteers are needed. Larger libraries are having difficulties, too. These are special libraries, run by the local societies, and are not part of the public library system and therefore

not funded by them.

I want to encourage every researcher to support her or his local society and/or the society that is in the area they do most of their research. Many of these societies have a nominal annual fee that most anyone

should be able to afford. It goes a long way in helping to cover operating costs of the library and the publishing costs of larger books. While sales of their books do offset costs, it is the membership that is most important.

Join and support genealogical and historical societies. Help to ensure the continued flow of information and research availability at the local level.
