p. 1 Growing Plano: Precision Manufacturing Company opened on South K Avenue and near Highway 75.

Clayton Woodward, vice president of Texas Wire and Cable, announced its half million dollar expansion.

Soon Central Expressway will come through Plano from where it stopped just north of Richardson. Eastman Products Corporation, Texas Wire and Cable and Precision Manufacturing are running full steam. Throughout Texas, Plano is known as the Copper Capital of the Southwest.

On Lance Renfrow's trip to Dallas to sell his hogs, he noticed the family cat had stashed her baby kittens under the driver's seat to keep him company on his trip south. He happily returned the kittens to his farm when he arrived home.
