### Queries

SEARCHING: Victor **BAUTISTA** and his wife Blasa or Blaza **CARRILLO** were married in 1885 in Bexar County. The Claretian Missionaries in San Antonio's records show he was 48 when they married so his estimated birth year is 1837. Victor is the grandfather of Genece Bautista **FILES** of Amarillo, and father of Alfonso born about 1890, and Teresa born about 1893. Both were born in San Antonio. There may have been other children. Blasa was living in the home of her son Alfonso and wife Cleo, and Genece at 801 Lamar according to the 1939-1940 Amarillo City Directory. Teresa was a bookkeeper for Russell Station Store at 707 Jackson Street. Her company later transferred her to Dallas. She was probably unmarried and about 47 in 1940. You must have a space that is yours, even if it's just the dining room table. If that is the case, then keep your genealogy tools and materials together in a specified place and in a container that allows for ease in bringing it to the table when you are going to work.

Genealogy research requires being organized, having space to work and grow, and a place to keep all the paperwork that seems to multiply like rabbits. Your organization system needs to be simple, but sophisticated enough to allow you to retrieve a document in a matter of minutes. Having a computer and a desk is a good start. A typewriter may be useful, but frankly I have not used mine in over a decade. I prefer to use the computer. A bookcase is a must!

I have several "categories" of four drawer file cabinets as well as short cabinets. They are organized by surnames being researched; by subject or topic; by course topics; by lecture topics; and, one that

contains my manuscripts and desktop publishing.

Besides filing cabinets, you need bookcases to hold three-ring notebooks for organizing your research on different surnames to take to the library and archives. Better still, if you have a laptop computer that is perfect.

If I choose to print out my history or copies of documents, I use three-ring notebooks—four-inch width, white with clear pockets on front and spine. By keeping a photocopy of my research notes and forms in the notebook, I can leave the originals safely at home in the respective surname book.

Example: Let"s use the surname "Kellow" as an example. At the front I have an Index of items kept in the book for easy retrieval. I number the first original found for that surname, "KEL-001." The **KEL-001** second is "Kel-002." It doesn't matter if births, deaths or deeds are filed together as long as the **KEL-002** numbering system and the index are up to date. Lately I've entered the year I found the record. Using 2009 as the example, I just add a dash after the record number, and a year to denote the KEL-004-2009 date. See example.

My genealogical information on the computer is filed under the major folder called,

"Genealogy Surnames." In that folder I file folders for every surname I am researching. I have folders under the surname labeled Biographies, Census, Deeds, Marriages, Military, Taxes, Vital Records [birth, death], and Voting Records. When I add my findings to my genealogy database, I use those numbers [example: KEL-001-1965] as the reference number for filing and finding the photocopies of originals. I have only to flip through the book to find what I am looking for.

Keep your filing up to date and remember, "File, don"t pile."

#### List of States by Statehood Date

*‡* Original 13 states. All became states on July 4, 1776. They are listed here, however, by their dates of ratifying the Constitution.

\* Congress recognized the state of Ohio on February 19, 1803<sup>[1]</sup>, but no formal date of statehood was set by the act of admission or a later resolution, as occurred with all other new states. On August 7, 1953, Congress passed a law retroactively setting the date of Ohio's statehood at March 1, 1803, the date when Ohio's first legislature convened.

"An act to provide for the due execution of the laws of the United States, within the state of Ohio", Seventh Congress, Session II, Chapter VII

<sup>†</sup> The actual statehood proclamations for North and South Dakota were intentionally shuffled so that no one actually knows which was admitted first; President Benjamin Harrison always refused to tell the order in which he signed the two statehood bills. However, North Dakota's proclamation was published first in the *Statutes at Large* (since it is first alphabetically).
