War of 1812 Pensions

The Federation of Genealogy Societies has partnered with the National Archives and Fold3 (formerly Footnote) to make the War of 1812 pension files available online. The images are available for free on Fold3. The goal is to digitize 7.2 million images in 180,000 files. A donation of \$25 will digitize 50 images. The first images are now available on Fold3, there are 71,668 images online today which is less than 1% of the files.

The first pensions were granted based on disability or death of the soldier. Later they were based on service. Pension files can contain the veteran's name, age, place of residence, widow's name, proof of marriage, service dates and unit, widow's maiden name, death dates for soldier and widow, bounty land acres granted, and more.

1936 Texas Centennial Exposition

In 1936 Texas held a state-wide, year-long celebration for its one-hundred years of freedom from Mexico. Almost every community in the state had some sort of event honoring the state but the main event was the \$25,000,000 Texas Centennial Exposition held at Dallas from June through November.

The Exposition was held on the grounds of the Texas State Fair near downtown Dallas. The art-deco buildings constructed for the Centennial are still in use today at Fair Park.

In anticipation of the many visitors coming to the state for the Exposition, Texas did several things. The roads leading to Dallas were improved, including present-day SH 5. It was SH 75 in those days. Instead of zigzagging along property lines like the old road, the new road was straight and went through the center of all of the towns along its path.

The state awarded historical markers to each of the Texas' counties. The marker for Collin County is mounted on a large granite rock and is located on the grounds of the old Collin County courthouse square in downtown McKinney.

The state also honored some of its historic settlers with historical markers. The Centennial historical marker for Collin McKinney is located in Finch Park in McKinney.

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The other Centennial marker in Collin County is for Dr. William Throckmorton, who came to the area in 1841 before statehood. Throckmorton County is named for him. One of his sons became governor of Texas. This marker is located by Throckmorton's grave in the Throckmorton Cemetery, which is located on private property west of Anna.

Collin County celebrated the Centennial by putting on display the house of its most famous early settler. The abandoned Collin McKinney cabin was acquired and moved to McKinney.

The cabin was still standing at its original location north of Anna. It was built in 1846 with slave labor. It was large for cabin with one large room and a couple of small rooms. The loft was used for sleeping quarters. McKinney had ten children. A guest room was on the front of the house. Travelers could spend the night in the room but did not have access to the rest of the house.

Preparations to move the cabin took several days, but the fifteen mile move to McKinney was completed in one day. The house was placed near the intersection of SH 5 (Tennessee Street in 1936) and present-day US 380.

Over 10,000 people signed the guest registry at the cabin. There were visitors from all over the world.

After the Centennial Celebration the cabin was moved to Finch Park in McKinney. It was used for educational purposes to teach students about pioneer life. The cabin burned in 1980.
